In 2012 seven rhinos were identified with cameratraps, the first sightings in 26 years

Way Kambas National Park 20-25 rhinos

In the park is the Way Kambas center for captive breeding.

In 2017 there are seven rhinos:

- Ratu, Bina and Rosa, three females caught in the wild
- Andalas, a male born in 2001 in Cincinnati Zoo
- Harapan, a brother of Andalas, born in 2007 in Cincinnati Zoo
- Andatu, son of Ratu and Andalas, born in 2012
- Delilah, daughter of Ratu and Andalas, born in 2016

Two separate groups here: less than 10 in the south, maybe 20 in the north

during the past decades, all strongholds of the Sumatran rhino in central Sumatra were sacrificed to logging and palm oil production

The Sumatran rhino was officially declared extinct in Sabah in March 2015. The last known animal was caught here, in the Danum Valley, a year earlier and is now in the Tabin Wildlife Reserve

Tabin Wildlife Reserve

No rhino was seen here since 2011.

In the park is the captive breeding center of the Borneo Rhino Alliance.

In 2017 there are two rhinos:

- Tam, a male caught in Tabin in 2008
- Iman, a female caught in the Danum Valley on 10 March 2014

assumed extinct since the nineties

Kelian Protected Forest 46 km² 6-15 rhinos

This population was discovered in 2013. Two rhinos were identified with camera traps.

In March 2016 the WWF announced that there are 6-15 rhinos here.

On 12 March one was caught. She died on 5 April as a result of an infection caused by a snare.
